

The tax team everyone loves

By the time April 15 arrives, Northminster volunteers will have prepared and filed state and federal tax returns for about 425 people. David Addison, Marianne Lord and Dan Wells help dozens of taxpayers in the Well every Wednesday and some Tuesdays in a free program in partnership with the IRS and United Way.

"They love this team, they love this location," says Trudy Teemley, ministry assistant. She often takes calls from people wanting help setting up an appointment. Many are intimidated by the IRS and worry over money owed. "It's not just the numbers. It's the anxiety and fear. I hear it in their voices."

People have been coming back for years: young and old, married and single, some with little kids in tow. Some speak limited English, a few can't read. Most are from Finneytown, Mt. Healthy, North College Hill, College Hill, Greenhills and Forest Park.

IRS rules limit the free assistance to people with incomes under \$70,000. But no one is turned away, and everyone is treated with care and respect.

Appointments are taken now, but before covid, it was first come, first served. As many as 70 people might line up in the parking lot hours before doors opened at 10 or 11. In cold or rain, people would take turns holding each other's spots as they took quick breaks inside their heated vehicles.

These days, Marianne and Dan

welcome visitors, often with cookies and coffee, and make sure they have proper forms and documentation. David and several other non-church volunteers prepare the returns. It's not unusual for them to file returns for multiple states if that's where people worked. Most people receive a refund, but not all.

David says reward comes with every return filed: "It's a way to help others."

Learning God's missions

A young Phillip Roebuck and friends were moved to tears, so heartbreaking was the poverty they found on a mission trip in Philadelphia in 2006. In Nicaragua, teens helped build a new community to rescue poor families living in a "Devil's Triangle" between a toxic river and a cemetery. People were so desperate they were rummaging through trash in the river hoping to find items to use or sell.

Phillip recalls these missions and others as life-changing, powerful experiences that helped build faith, friendship and a deep desire to do God's work, wherever that took him.

Today, Phillip is a new elder and chair of the Missions Committee. He has participated in 13 mission trips beginning as a summer youth intern in 2005. Since then, he has helped lead missions to places including New Mexico; Iowa; Niagara, N.Y.; Alabama; the Gulf Coast of Louisiana after Hurricane Katrina; and right here in Cincinnati.

The Second-Mile offering in April will provide scholarships for youth and young adults to continue taking trips like these. This summer, Northminster teams will be on missions in Guatemala and Indianapolis.

"This Second-Mile offering will impact countless people, including those who receive the scholarships, the other members of their teams, and the people they serve. Mission trips had a profound impact on my faith, relationships and the way I seek to live my life as a follower of Jesus. Everybody sees a season of purpose and opportunity.

Who'll be in charge? And other Qs answered

What exactly is a sabbatical?

A period of rest, renewal and recovery. For three months, Greg will be able to step away from Northminster for prayer and reflection without the urgent demands of day-to-day church leadership. He will not be answering phone calls or returning emails, and we will not be reaching out to him.

Is a sabbatical a common thing for a pastor?

Yes. It's spelled out in a policy by the Presbytery of Cincinnati, of which we are a member. Session approved Greg's sabbatical last October, and it's part of his terms of call. Nancy Ross-Zimmerman was the last pastor at Northminster to take a sabbatical, from May 1-Aug. 31, 2011. And a sabbatical actually has roots in the Bible, in the concept of Sabbath or rest after seven days.

Who'll be in charge while Pastor Greg is out?

Pastor Daniel Meister, our Director of Congregational Care, will be answering pastoral concerns. Mike Steel, executive director, will continue to handle administrative affairs. Church elders and deacons, staff and volunteer leaders, Life Groups and regular activities will continue as usual. The office will be open normal working hours and reachable at (513) 931-0243.

Will anything be put on hold while Greg's gone?

Not really. Greg asks that we think of this as a time to likewise pause, reflect and renew our own missions of connecting every day with people in our homes, communities and workplaces.
